Jim Davidson is a Christian businessman and a native of the state of Arkansas. His career as a public speaker, author and motivational consultant has spanned almost 40 years. Some of his many awards and achievements include: Arkansas Salesman Of The Year, Chairman of the sales organization of the Little Rock Chamber Of Commerce, Justice Of The Peace in Pulaski County, Chairman of Speakers Bureau of the Pulaski County United Way, Leadership Gavel as voted by members of his Dale Carnegie Class and honorary member of the DECA and GCE Clubs of Arkansas. He was recently presented the 2006 "Good Neighbor Award" by the Conway Area Chamber of Commerce.

In 1979 he began writing and producing a daily radio program titled "HOW TO PLAN YOUR LIFE" that has been aired by stations coast to coast and heard by thousands of people each week day. Several years ago he also began writing a weekly newspaper column for his hometown newspaper the LOG CABIN DEMOCRAT in Conway, Arkansas. Being self-



syndicated, from that humble beginning his column has run in over 300 newspapers in 35 states across the nation. Title: Meeting the Arkansas TravelerGrades: 4-12

This session examines the impact that the Arkansas Traveler image had on the state of Arkansas, an essential ingredient for understanding Arkansas history. The Arkansas Traveler began as a story in the early 19th century. A fiddle tune and painting soon accompanied the story. The story traveled beyond our borders and created a national image for Arkansas. The session will model many approaches for presenting this topic to students. We'll hear an eye-witness account of Col. Sanford Faulkner telling his story; perform one of many versions of the dialogue; learn about the artist; hear the fiddle tune and examine reproductions of the pioneer objects painted in the famous Arkansas Traveler picture. We will trace how the image of the Arkansas Traveler shaped us and discover a subtle change in the original story that made such a difference.

Are you looking for engaging and interactive ways to make literacy come alive as you engage students, parents, and the community by showing the impact literacy has on lives in the classroom and in the world beyond school. This workshop will provide creative strategies for showcasing literacy connections between school, home, and the world while improving parent and student attendance at parent nights. The objective of the session will be to share the impact of illiteracy on society and then to present innovative ideas focusing on literacy that may be adapted for use in other schools and communities. The session will include topics from projects that have been implemented in Wynne such as The Wynne Bookcase Project which includes <u>Expresso</u> <u>Expressions</u>. <u>Cappuccino Calculations</u>, <u>Crime Scene Investigation Night</u>, <u>Stepping Up to Literacy</u>, and <u>An Oral History Night at the Museum</u>. 



8:35 am – 9:45 am Keynote Speaker - Susan Perry Literacy Coach, Little Rock School District The Real Thing: Where We <u>Are</u> And Where We <u>Need</u> To Be In Expository Literacy Instruction

Susan Perry is a literacy coach at Little Rock School District. Susan received her Doctor of Education in Higher Education (Emphasis in Special education), and Education Specialist in Reading at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. She also has a Master's of Education in Special Education

from Loyola College in Baltimore, Maryland. She completed her undergraduate work at Oklahoma State University in Stillwater, Oklahoma and received a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education. Some of the specialized training honors she has received include: Effective Literacy Foundations; grades 2nd to 4th trainer, Early Literacy and Language in Arkansas; grades K-1st trainer, Reading Recovery Teacher and Teacher - Leader Certified (year-long training), and Math and Science Crusade (year-long training). She is a University of Arkansas and HIPPY (Spectrum) Pre-School Trainer for Pre-K Ella, Social Emotional, and Frameworks. She has been an Assistant Professor of Education at Hendrix College in Conway, a Research Associate at University of Arkansas, Assistant to Director of Special Programs at Ouachita Baptist University, Special Education Resource Teacher at Arkadelphia School District and Russellville School District, and an Alternative Classroom Teacher at Russellville. She is a 2007 recipient of



SRATE (Southeastern Regional Association of Teacher Educators) *Innovation in Teacher Education Award*. She is licensed in 1-6 Elementary Education, K-12 Special Education-Mildly Handicapped, and K-8 Reading.

Topic: Discuss stats on comprehension, vocabulary, and writing of K-12 children as it relates to non-fiction text. Discuss the importance of beginning literacy instruction with non-fiction reading and writing in early childhood and build on it as children continue in their education (versus waiting until they are in second grade to begin non-fiction instruction). Explain how this type of seamless instruction can occur by talking about the International Reading Association's literacy standards for

K-12 grade. She will also discuss how non-fiction text instruction has changed over the years. (teachers should be making vocabulary walls instead of asking students to write definitions of vocabulary terms out of a dictionary, how to make nonfiction more meaningful to the learner by showing students how to make text to self connections, etc).

Title: Earthquakes for Educators Grades: 5-8

In this session you will learn about the earthquake history of Arkansas, including a series of major earthquakes that occurred in 1811-1812 on the New Madrid seismic zone. Participants will explore the basics of seismic energy and how scientists measure and locate earthquake epicenters. The presenter will take a look at current seismicity around the state and the recent efforts to locate earthquakes with the newly installed Arkansas seismic network.

Title: Civil War to Civil RightsGrades: 7-9

The objective of this presentation is to explore the connections between 19th Century slave resistance and the 20th Century Civil Rights movement in Arkansas. Emancipation ended slavery but it took another century for African Americans to receive court constitutional rights and equal protection of those rights by the federal government. We will use primary source, as well as secondary, available onsite and/or online from the National Park Service to explore this transition.

Title: What Makes Arkansas History Exciting? Techniques and Exercises for Learning Grades: 6-12

This workshop will cover ways to make Arkansas history exciting and relevant to students in grades sixth through twelve. There are various exercises inside and outside the classroom that can make the study of the state's history very interesting to these young people as well as projects that can help in serving the community. The workshop will also include ways to connect Arkansas history to U.S. national history and to world history. Often, Arkansas history is taught in a vacuum and students do not understand the relevance of the events, movements, and people that defined our state's history. Many events in Arkansas history are directly tied to events in national and world history. What we will present are exercises, storylines, and resources that can help your students make these important connections. We will also have a session on connecting Arkansas history to various writing exercises and assignments for the classroom. Many of these are quite unique and they do tie these two important learning areas, history and writing, together.
